THE SCHOOL DAY

Foundations, Early Years, and Primary Years Programme

- 08.20 am School begins with Registration
- 3.35 pm Lessons end

The school premises will be open every school day between **07h30-18h30** and the underground parking facilities are available on a first-come-first-served basis. Additional parking is available outside the school building.



STUDENT LATE ARRIVALS

It cannot be emphasised enough how important it is that students are in the classroom on time to avoid disrupting the class and affecting the rhythm of a child's morning. A student will be marked as Late if they arrive after morning registration at 8:20 am.

An excused late arrival includes such situations as a medical appointment, family emergency, or extenuating circumstances and must be documented by a parent note, email, or phone call. Reasons such as car trouble, personal business, and heavy traffic, among others, while understandable, are not considered excused situations.

If a student is continually late, the Homeroom teacher must contact the parents. Five or more unjustified absences and/or less than 80% attendance is considered a failing condition.

BEGINNING OF DAY ARRANGEMENTS

- International Sharing School opens its gates at 7:30 am;
- Students should be in their classrooms by 8:20 am.

END OF DAY ARRANGEMENTS

- International Sharing School closes its gates at 6:30 pm;
- If due to exceptional circumstances parents cannot get to school on time to collect their children, they should contact the school office at (+351) 214876140;
- Lessons end at 3.35 pm.

STUDENTS' SCHOOL UNIFORM

At International Sharing School, all students from Foundations 1 should wear school uniform when attending school or when participating in a school-organised event outside normal school hours unless exempted from doing so by the Pedagogical Director on designated days.

Effective teaching and learning require organisation, and this starts with a smart and tidy appearance which helps to instil discipline and pride in students' appearance.

LINES OF COMMUNICATION

Respecting the lines of communication will allow us to work efficiently and consistently, creating mutual and trusted respect.

- 1. **Classroom Teacher:** Appointments can be arranged personally, by email or via the school office.
- 2. **Head of PYP**: Concerns that cannot be resolved through a meeting with the Class Teacher/Tutor, or questions of a more general nature concerning the operation of the school and its programmes, may be discussed with the specific Head of Programme. Appointments can be arranged via email or the school office.
- 3. **Principal**: If more information is required or the concern remains unresolved, parents may wish to contact the Principal. Appointments can be arranged via the school office or direct e-mail.
- 4. **Board of Directors**: If a policy problem cannot be resolved after a meeting with the Educational Consultant, it may be referred to the Board of Directors. Appointments can be arranged via the school office.

LANGUAGE OF COMMUNICATION

While International Sharing School respects and encourages the host country language and the varied mother tongues of our students and parents, the **English language is the language** of instruction of the school and the official language of communication with the whole school community.



REPORTING

Reports are written and sent to parents throughout the three school terms.

Term 1

Settlement Report - includes a comment by the homeroom teacher and an effort grade.

End-of-term 1 Progress Report - includes effort and achievement grades and teachers comments.

Term 2

End-of-term 2 Progress Report - includes effort and achievement grades and classroom teacher comment.

Term 3

End-of-term 2 Progress Report - includes effort and achievement grades and teachers comments. This official and legal document proves your child completed the current academic year and can transition to the following year.

SMOKE-FREE CAMPUS

International Sharing School is a smoke-free campus. Smoking and using all tobacco products are banned for everybody in or on all school facilities and property. It is forbidden to smoke inside the school or outside, near any of the two school buildings.

This includes banning smoking in school buses and vans used to transport faculty and students on field trips or other school events.

DRUGS

Our school has zero tolerance for drugs found on school premises. Students found with substances in their possession will be immediately expelled from school.

EVACUATION PROCEDURES

Our priority is to minimise the risk to life and to reduce injury by maintaining all our staff, students, and visitors safe.

STUDENT LUNCH

International Sharing School provides daily lunch for all students. All students are expected to eat in the refectory following their timetabled lunch break.

Students are not permitted to eat in the classrooms and along the corridors.

Before the start of the new school year, parents must bring the completed food allergy or intolerance form and the necessary documentation from their family doctor. Parents should also ensure that children are aware of their allergies or intolerances and inform the school office if they are concerned about what they are eating.

ASSEMBLIES

PYP assemblies will occur twice a month, on Mondays morning at 8.20. Each grade level must organise and present at least one assembly every six weeks. These assemblies and gatherings are related to the IB Learner Profile/Units of inquiry and are designed primarily for the students. Parents are always welcome to join us and celebrate together our students' achievements.

BIRTHDAY PARTIES

At International Sharing School, we enjoy honouring students on their birthdays. We announce the birthday child's name on our Monday morning PYP assembly and students and teachers will sing "Happy Birthday".

If you are bringing a cake, we ask you to ensure it is from a fully authorised bakery that follows all the hygiene and safety measures. Please ask the bakery to provide you with the technical recipe sheet. This document is compulsory when bringing a cake to our school. If you are baking the cake, the same technical sheet is required, which includes all ingredients used and the date the cake was baked.

Please, talk to the classroom teacher in advance to check students' allergies, food restrictions, and the best time to bring the cake.

We take great pride in making your child feel special on their birthday.



FIELD TRIPS

Field trips are an important learning dimension; all students are expected to participate in planned activities. A field trip is an educational activity that involves all members of a class outside of the classroom. It will involve prior preparation for the activity, follow-up evaluation, and work in class after the trip. Students take field trips several times during the school year. The teacher will determine the purpose and arrangements for a particular field trip. Parents will be informed in advance of a field trip. In some instances, parents may be invited to assist as chaperones.

AFTER-SCHOOL ACTIVITIES

Students are encouraged to participate in various sporting, aesthetic, recreational, and cultural extracurricular activities. These take place after school and are organised in 3 terms by teachers/teaching assistants, external instructors, and parent volunteers. Parents with particular expertise who would like to offer an after-school activity are encouraged to contact the school. Each year, various activities are provided for students, which are determined by interest and availability to organise particular activities. At the beginning of each term, information regarding the activities and the sign-up procedures are communicated to parents through the mail. Students are asked to think carefully about balancing their program so they can fully commit themselves to their academic requirements and experience a diverse range of after-school

Once the school day ends, students will be accompanied to their respective activities. At the end of the activity, students will be accompanied to a designated area where parents will collect them.

TECHNOLOGY, MEDIA, MOBILE PHONES

Students are not permitted to bring mobile phones to school. Should a faculty member see a student using their mobile phone during the break, lunchtime, or lesson time, the mobile telephone will be confiscated and passed on to the Programme Coordinator. The parents will then have to collect the mobile phone at the end of the day. Repeated violations may require further action.

Under no circumstance should a student be contacting a parent directly regarding any issue. All communication must be made through the Office, Classroom Teacher, school nurse or Programme Coordinator, depending on the issue.

IPods and personal listening devices are not permitted during school hours, including breaks and lunchtime, and these rules are in the best interests of students. Social interaction is an important part of a child's growth and using personal listening devices at school greatly limits this interaction.

All staff are expected to set an example regarding Mobile Phones and iPods. Teachers are expected to keep their mobile phones in their bags, only using them during lunch and break.

TOYS AND PETS

Expensive toys, electronic toys, plastic swords, guns, weapons, daggers, or knives are not permitted on campus. Students should be informed that they are responsible for any object brought to school. At no point should a student's item be allowed to disrupt classroom instruction. In general, they should not be brought to school. An exception is in the foundations years programme, where students are encouraged to bring in a comfort toy during their settling-in period if it helps to settle the child. The school accepts no responsibility for losing or damaging students' valuable personal items.

We have 3 school pets, George, and a Great Dane dog and Mel and Nyx, two Portuguese Water Dogs. Along with George, Mel and Nyx, every PYP classroom can have a classroom pet. Students are responsible for taking care of their pets. Arrangements with the teacher should be made if the child/parent wishes to take the classroom pet for the weekend/holidays. Home pets are also allowed in our school, but before any animal is brought into our campus, the classroom teacher and programme coordinator must approve the visit.

STATIONERY SUPPLIES

All school stationery supplies are provided by the school and will be available in the classrooms. If there is loss or damage to school-provided stationery, parents will be required to purchase the needed items.



LOST AND FOUND

International Sharing School is a secure campus and a caring, principled community. Students are expected to take due care of their belongings and not leave valuable items unattended, as this invites the potential for things to go missing. If students misplace an item, they should check at the school office or reception.

Office staff will be happy to assist students and parents in locating missing items. Parents are asked to help by <u>labelling clothing</u> and other items with the child's full name to allow an easy finding of lost items. Please be informed that any unclaimed items will be donated to local charities, typically right before the Summer break.

Students are encouraged to hand in found items to the school reception or teacher.

MANAGEBAC

Managebac is a leading online planning, assessment and reporting platform for over 3,000 IB schools, and provides ISS with one unified system ensuring consistency and an integrated experience for the school community to manage the curriculum. Managebac is used to support curriculum mapping, the setting of assignments, homework and assessments for students. The system allows for the tracking of, and reporting on, assessments and student progress. Teachers communicate grades and feedback to assignments via this platform, in addition to providing students with verbal feedback during class. It is vitally important for parents to support their child's academic journey, by regularly checking the data and teacher feedback, thereby providing uptodate information regarding student progress, rather than having to wait to receive an end of term report.

HEALTH AND SAFETY

INJURY PROCEDURES

In case of a minor injury, students should go to the nurse's office or the nurse will be called. Students will be transported to the hospital in case of a major accident, and their medical insurance will be activated (please refer to the Medical Insurance section below).

Regarding child protection issues, the school has a Child Protection Committee that will be activated in case of any suspicion of a child being mistreated. According to Portuguese law, such cases need to be reported to the Portuguese authorities.

COMMON ILLNESSES

In the best interest of the child and school community, children with a fever, nausea, cold/flu symptoms (runny nose or persistent cough), or any other signs of illness, should remain at home.

If a child shows signs of illness at school, the nurse will contact the parents, who will be required to pick up their child as soon as possible.

SCHOOL NURSE & MEDICATION

The school nurse is onsite during the school day to provide first aid and ensure that students with medical conditions are identified and adequately supported. Parents must inform the school nurse if their child has any allergy (food, medication, plants, animals and insects) or if their child has a life-threatening illness.

No student is permitted to carry medication in their possession. If a student has a medical condition requiring specific medication, then it is the Parents' responsibility to inform the school nurse, who will store the medicine in a safe location. Parents must send prescriptions to school with clear written instructions in their original packaging and a medical note.



FIRST AID AND MEDICAL CARE

If a student becomes ill or injured at school, they will be immediately attended to by the nurse; if they become sick or injured during PE or an external activity, they will be treated by a member of staff who has received officially recognised first aid training, and parents will be informed immediately.

If a serious injury occurs at school or further medical attention is needed, the school will immediately call an ambulance and/or paramedics.

If a child must be taken to the hospital by ambulance, the school nurse will accompany and remain with the child until the parents arrive.

MEDICAL INSURANCE

The school's medical insurance company is "Tranquilidade" and a 24-hour policy is in place for all children and staff; therefore, if a student becomes injured at school and requires a hospital visit, the school's medical insurance needs to be activated by the school nurse - Ms Inês Ramada <u>i.ramada@taguspark.sharingschool.org</u>.

The school's reference hospital is São Francisco Xavier, in Belém/Algés, which is a public hospital. If families prefer to go to a private hospital, they will have to pay a 50€ fee (non-refundable), and all the associated costs to the incident will have to be paid by the families upfront. It is vitally important to keep copies of all invoices and medical reports so they can be sent to the medical insurance company and reimbursed.

PARENTS & THE SCHOOL COMMUNITY

Parents are a key asset to our community and bring valuable input and feedback. We encourage parents to communicate with their child's teacher and immediately inform them of social or academic concerns. Should a parent wish to speak with other staff members or a leadership team member, please follow the information in "Lines of Communication".

Parent representation is organised through our Parents and Teachers Group (PTG) and meets regularly with the school Board and Pedagogical Leadership Team to create joint activities and find areas for improvement.

There are many occasions for celebrating during the school academic year, and we encourage our parents to actively engage with the school community.

PARENT TEACHER GROUP (PTG)

The Parent Teacher Group at ISS is a community comprised of all our school's parents. As a parent, you are automatically a member of the PTG, which is led by a group of volunteers of parents and teachers. Our PTG communicates via the Classlist App, putting you in touch with the other parents in your children's classes, enabling you to use our listings section to buy and sell items, including second-hand uniforms, and learn about events and other happenings at our school. We encourage you to join our community as a volunteer at events, as a role model for our children and to make friends throughout our community.

THE IB LEARNER PROFILE

THE PRIMARY YEARS PROGRAMME (PYP)

The Primary Years Programme (PYP) of the International Baccalaureate Organisation focuses on the development of the whole child, in the classroom, but also the world outside. It offers a framework that meets children's diverse needs: academic, social, physical, emotional, and cultural.

The PYP is a comprehensive approach to teaching and learning with an international curriculum model that provides:

- Content guidelines and learning objectives;
- A teaching methodology;
- Assessment strategies.

The PYP is based on a commitment to structured inquiry as a vehicle for learning. The development of explicit attitudes and the expectation of socially responsible behaviour are also key components of the programme.

The curriculum model below gives a visual understanding of the programme's six Transdisciplinary Themes (Units Of Inquiry) through which to explore and engage with the content in 6 different subject areas.

The 6 Transdisciplinary Themes are:

- Who we are
- Where we are in place and time
- How we express ourselves
- How the world works
- How we organise ourselves
- Sharing the planet

The 6 subject areas are:

Language



- Mathematics
- Science
- Social Studies
- Arts
- Personal, Social, and Physical Education

In the course of the year, the learning activities related to the different areas of knowledge are integrated, whenever possible, into one of the six units of inquiry.

The core of the curriculum model shows the Five Essential Elements common to all teaching and learning: concepts, skills, knowledge, attitudes, and action. In the course of their studies, students develop an understanding of general concepts, skills (thinking, communication, social, research, and self-management), attitudes, actions, and knowledge itself.

Learning in the PYP is:

Inquiry-based: We believe children learn best through structured, purposeful inquiry. Students are expected to play an active role in and take responsibility for, their learning. Students are encouraged to ask questions, investigate and find ways to answer these questions and sustain this enjoyment of learning throughout life.

Collaborative: Learning is a social endeavour, and there is great emphasis on sharing, group work, and collaboration at our school. Students learn to communicate well, encourage each other, and develop an open mind so they can learn from each other.

Differentiated: The learner is at the heart of our curriculum framework. Children come to school with a range of experiences, backgrounds, and prior knowledge. Teachers in the PYP aim to design learning to suit children at all different levels of competence or experience, providing support for those who need it, and extensions for those who need more challenge.

Concept-driven: Students spend their time at school exploring and learning about important concepts that have relevance in their own lives, and that they can transfer to other contexts. Our aim is to develop students' understanding of big ideas, not just their knowledge or skills.

The Concepts

The concepts that are central to the PYP curriculum are presented in the form of questions. These questions shape the units of inquiry giving them direction and purpose.



The 7 Concepts are:

Form: What is it like?

Function: How does it work? **Causation**: Why is it like it is? **Change**: How is it changing?

Connection: How is it connected to other things?

Perspective: What are the points of view? **Responsibility**: What is our responsibility?

The Attitudes

The development of personal attitudes towards people, towards the environment, and towards learning are an essential part of the PYP. These attitudes contribute to the well-being of the individual and the group.

The Attitudes are:

Appreciation: Appreciating the wonder and beauty of the world and its people.

Commitment: Being committed to their learning, persevering, and showing self-discipline and responsibility.

Confidence: Feeling confident in their ability as learners, having the courage to take risks, applying what they have learned, and making appropriate decisions and choices.

Cooperation: Cooperating, collaborating, and leading or following as the situation demands.

Creativity: Being creative and imaginative in their thinking and their approach to problems and dilemmas.

Curiosity: Being curious about the nature of learning, about the world, its people, and cultures

Empathy: Imagining themselves in another's situation to understand his or her reasoning and emotions, to be open-minded and reflective about the perspectives of others.

Enthusiasm: Enjoying learning and willingly putting effort into the process.

Independence: Thinking and acting independently, making their judgments based on reasoned argument, and being able to defend their judgments.

Integrity: Being honest and demonstrating a considered sense of fairness.


Respect: Respecting themselves, others, and the world around them.
